Two things to look out for in March:

- We will be felling 3 trees on Goose Green shortly.
 Obviously no-one wants to fell trees but, following our recent tree survey, these 3 were found to be badly diseased and consequently in danger of falling.
- Safety signs will be going on the Target Hut. We cannot demolish it even though it is in danger of collapsing. The signs are a stop-gap while we wait for permission to fence it off. (we need permission as the Common is a SSSI)

If you've ever thought of having a family get-together such as a summer picnic, why not think about Goose Green as your venue? The Green can be hired at a very reasonable rate and would be the perfect place for your outdoor summer party.

Although summer is some way off there are already the first glimmers of it. When walking on the Meadow there is now the pleasure of the return of the skylark. We hear so much about the gradual disappearance of so many bird species. In the UK, the skylark population has declined dramatically: there are now 10% of the numbers that were present 30 years ago. However, we are more than lucky to have a healthy population on and around the Meadow. On a recent walk five individual birds could be heard all enthusiastically climbing high and calling to mark their territory. To be able to walk within minutes of our homes and hear the call of the skylark is priceless. So next time you're on the Meadow, just listen out and hear the real sound of summer which is now just around the corner.
