
## Are you a Commoner?

## A busy day on Wovercote Green

Last month's work-day proved quite a crowded event. Not only was there a good turn out of helpers for the work-day, but they were also joined by one of the Meadowshare group

turning the recently cut hay ready for bailing, as well as the Wolvercote Wildlife Explorers, a junior branch of the RSPB.



Sixteen keen youngsters turned up with their four leaders, June Williams, Jo Malden, Steve Goddard and Keren Wright. The June session focussed on flowers and insects on Wolvercote

Green. Samples from 3 different areas of the Green were found and then brought back to the main group, where the leaders helped identify the different species. They then went on to have a go at drawing them. Some of the species found were leaf beetles, a green shield bug, froghopper larvae, green nettle weevils, a capsid bug, a rove beetle, the handsome red cardinal beetle and many more. Now that Wolvercote Green is receiving lots of TLC during the Commoners' Work-days there is an abundance of new flora and fauna to be found during the exploring days!
