## 2019 could be the year to help bring Swifts back to Wolvercote

Some of you may have noticed the reduction in the number of swifts in our area. Although we still have a healthy population of swallows and house martins, swifts are sadly in decline. One of the reasons for this is the lack of suitable nesting places. In the past there have always been old barns, houses with pantile rooves or odd nooks and crannies ready for the perfect nest. But with modern houses everything is sealed and air tight so not a hole in sight for that new home.

#### So what can we do to help bring back our Swifts?

To try and help improve the situation the RSPB is offering **FREE** Swift nest boxes to community groups in the Oxford City area. As a community group the Commoners can place a group order. ## Speeding on Godstow Road

Nearly 4 years ago approaches were made to the County Council about the possibility of some sort of speed controls on the Godstow Road. Although there was unanimous support for some form of control, when it was raised at the Commoners' AGM, and plenty of correspondence with the Council, the possibility remained quite remote for many reasons. However, in the last few months the project has been resurrected and, combined with an opinion poll in the village, it is now showing signs of becoming feasible.

A team of Madeleine Metcalfe, Rob Whitty and Phillip Dove, met up with the council and local councillors before Christmas and, following much discussion, a way forward at last seemed possible. Therefore over the next few months there will be consultations with local residents and various public utilities (fire service, ambulance, public transport etc) before we proceed. Although the prospect of speed control in the village is now within sight, there is still some time to go. But. in the meantime. watch this space as we will be keeping you up to date as we go! Let's hope that 2019 will see some slowing down of the traffic on Godstow Road, something which will become even more important as the Mill Site development progresses.
